Eco Snippet: January is the time when we keen gardeners start ordering seeds and planting sweet peas and beans. Please consider buying only peat free compost - it is widely available and quality is improving all the time. Here is a quote from the RHS website on the benefits of going peat free: 'Preserving rare peatlands is vital for the unique biodiversity they support, as well as for the wider environment. These habitats are important carbon stores and draining them for peat extraction releases carbon dioxide, contributing to climate change. Peatlands also play a key role in soaking up excess rainfall, helping to prevent localised flooding.'
